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 , , . , - , cuisine of the Old World which they had left behind them; and in one

respects at least their tables were as well furnished with good things to eat as it was possible for a family who lived without servants to make them.

In this little house there dwelt no maidens or damsels, nor any menial or bondsman: the household consisted of only six persons—the head and mistress of the house and her two daughters; they were all young women, but not girls in our sense of that word, for they had attained their majority. The oldest sister was nineteen years old (so she said), and though still a girl by American standards, she was as tall and straight-limbed as any man; with her short brown hair curling around the temples over narrow shoulders, in fact she looked like an ordinary farmwoman who had been brought up to read Latin and Greek. The younger sister was just sixteen years old, and very pretty, but not so tall or strong as her sister—a little shorter than average height for a woman of the nineteenth century, with long, soft brown hair which hung straight over her shoulders in great masses; her face had an extraordinary brightness about it, giving to all her features something of that fresh and delicate glow which so often accompanies early health. The two girls wore dresses made entirely from homespun cloth—dresses such as their mother herself would have worn if she still lived in the days when spinning and weaving were woman's work, rather than man's; they had no bonnets or petticoats to hide them.

The other three persons who made up this household consisted of a young doctor, who was their cousin on one side and their brother-in-law on the other (and so technically his sisters' husband); he had brought with him an African boy about ten years old; they were all very friendly together. The two girls had both been born in America, but after living there a few months longer than necessary to make them American citizens they had gone back home to England and settled down among the hills of Sussex—their father being English by birth (and by profession an artist), their mother was originally German (having come from Hamburg); so that these young ladies were what in Germany is called "Englisch Deutsch" or, as we would say, Anglo-German.

The doctor's nurse did not live with them always; but he came and went continually like a good friend who can drop by whenever it happens to suit him. He had been the first to learn about this

little house in Sussex and its three queer residents: afterwards he found out all about their past lives, and decided that here were two young women whom his profession made it incumbent on him to befriend and help if he could; but for both of them there was only one cure-marriage. Unfortunately the elder sister seemed already taken, or at least promised away (though whether for good or ill no one knew); so that the doctor's attentions were directed towards her younger sister with quite a frankness which would not have been possible in our own day and generation but for this girl's being out of their time altogether.

The two girls had never heard about any other form of marriage than what is called "the churching"-in fact, they knew nothing whatever about the ways of men except as shown by books; nor did either of them know that she was anything more than a mere friend to this doctor until he told her so. The younger sister (Elizabeth) had not even then any inkling how great a difference there could be between friendship and love, or why one man should think himself privileged to make advances toward his female friends while another might behave as if they were simply acquaintances; but she was quite certain that no woman would ever feel towards anyone the sort of passionate emotion which this doctor felt towards her.

The little household was very quiet and peaceful, though not altogether happy: for both girls had lost some one whom they dearly loved-their parents-and each often wondered what their lives might have been if these two persons who were so necessary to them had still lived. But after all it was better as things were; there would be no need of any pretence or hypocrisy, but a frank and open-hearted way of living which made for mutual trust and sympathy.

The household did not earn its daily bread in the usual manner by working at manual labor, but simply on account of their having been brought up to expect nothing less than an independent existence from themselves; though all three had also learned some useful handicrafts-the doctor could spin wool, Elizabeth knew how to weave cloth and make a simple frame for holding it while the warp was being crossed by the woof.

The house itself contained only two rooms upstairs-a large chamber at one end which served as dining room, sitting room and kitchen during the daytime; this had windows on three sides opening towards the hills behind, a great fireplace with a wide range of shelves running round it for keeping books or preserves, several stout chairs and tables. The other was Elizabeth's bedroom-a small square chamber furnished simply but comfortably as befitted its use: besides her own bedstead and writing table there were two trunks filled with linen and clothing.

The house stood on a grassy slope of the Sussex hills, having views of country spreading far away toward sea-coast to southward; it was built by Elizabeth's father about thirty years before they came back from America and lived in it for many months after that time: so that when his daughters had attained their majority (in our sense of the word) he sold the place as unfit for family occupation, but left them a handsome sum of money which might serve to establish themselves elsewhere. The new owners were not rich enough to build another house on the same site; they hired out the ground-floor part and so made it into their home.

They lived here with the greatest possible contentment: no one would ever think of anything but peace and happiness as befitting such a household, or even suppose that there might be any dissatisfaction within its walls. Only Elizabeth herself sometimes thought sadly how much brighter her life might have been if she had never left America-if these old hills had not stood between her and the happy days in which she played with John Eliot: but of course it would always remain a mere "if" until God or Fate decided to grant that wish.

The household was very quiet on this particular morning, for Elizabeth's father being dead since long ago no one remembered him at all; and her mother had never been mentioned as though she were simply nonexistent: but now they would often talk of them together with the same affectionate feeling which might have dwelt in any other family.

On this particular morning there was a great bustle downstairs, for Elizabeth's younger sister Jane came home from visiting her cousin at another farm about three miles off. She had only been gone two hours; but it seemed as if she had been away all day: they found that she brought with her one of those beautiful sunny autumn days when the sky is cloudless, but not too hot or bright for comfortable walking in an open field.

The little house was now full of people-the doctor and his nurse, a neighboring family who had come to dinner; Elizabeth's older sister Catherine having been called away by some pressing business which would keep her from returning until late at night. The two sisters were very happy together in this busy way: they often said how strange it seemed that such different people should find their hearts drawn toward each other as if bound by chains, and the more so because for all of their lives no one else had ever loved them except in a friendly manner-as is usual among children.

When Jane entered the dining room she found her sister already seated at table with her breakfast ready; Elizabeth looked up as she came in-she was wearing a pale blue frock and bonnet, with which Catherine's new black silk gown made quite a contrast: it seemed to Jane that there were no two girls more alike than they appeared now. The sight of this brother-in-law brought Elizabeth back from her reverie; she smiled as he took his place at table opposite them and began eating with the same hearty appetite which had always distinguished him since the day when a hungry schoolboy came into their home to be taken care of. Jane thought how impossible it would have seemed that this man should ever come to love her sister-for herself he looked like an entirely different person; but then each was what life made them, and nothing could change Elizabeth's nature.

After breakfast the doctor took his leave: for a few weeks before now he had often been absent from home in company with some patient whom he attended without charge as one might do on a journey of pleasure-but since that day when Catherine told him about her business matters there seemed to be more reason than ever why he should go out among the hills instead of staying at his own fireside.

"I am so glad you came home," said Elizabeth, "for we shall miss your company even if only half as much as usual; but I suppose it is better that way-you will have time to think about something else besides us." Jane looked up with a surprised expression upon her face: she had never before heard such words from anyone.

"I am very happy," Elizabeth replied, "and yet sometimes there are moments when the happiness seems like a sort of imprisonment; it is as if some one outside were trying to reach me through these walls which shut us off from everything but what lies within them-my own mind included." Her words seemed almost unintelligible even to Jane: they had always been so much alike that there could be no doubt about the meaning of any expression used by either.

Jane was very glad indeed when her cousin went away, for Elizabeth's mood sometimes troubled her; but then she never thought herself superior enough in understanding or strength of character to deal with such things as these: only now and again would Jane say how strange it seemed that two girls who should be so much alike could ever feel differently about anything at all.

Elizabeth sat down alone after the others had gone; there were books on table, but she did not read them-her thoughts wandered far away from her present home and surroundings toward people long dead and scenes which had never been seen by anyone except herself: Catherine would often say that Elizabeth must have come back to earth from Heaven.

After a time Jane entered the room with an air of great importance about her: she held a letter in her hand, but did not speak until she was sure that her sister could hear every word without difficulty-as if there were some mystery concealed within those lines which only Elizabeth's own ears might be allowed to perceive.

Elizabeth did not answer immediately—it seemed as if some one had suddenly taken away all power of speech from within her; then she handed the letter to Jane and said nothing more.
